SCHOOL FUNDING THE STORY SO FAR

KEY

- Expenditure is higher than income
- Reduced levels of staffing
- Reduced budgets for resources and basic supplies
- Unfunded pay awards
- Pupil Premium
- SEND funding

THE IMPACT

47 of 47 schools in Camden have suffered cuts to per pupil funding

£20.2M lost out on between 2015-2019

£480 per pupil loss

THE BOROUGH SITUATION

- Per pupil funding was frozen in 2010
- Real terms inflation of 21% (consumer price index)
- Inflation pressure will rise to 26% by 2022
- Even with a 0.5% uplift Camden schools will have lost 24.8% over the 12 years
- Since 2015 Camden has lost £20.2M
