NC Statement:

- discover and develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied

Enrichment:

Year 5 trip to Paris

Children spend the whole day in Paris. They visit Montmartre, cruise along the Seine and look at the view of Paris from the Tour Montparnasse.

Whole School French Day

Children take part in an interactive workshop with the Big Wheel Theatre Company.

Cedar:

- listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding
- explore the patterns and sounds of language through songs and rhymes and link the spelling, sound and meaning of words
- engage in conversations; ask and answer questions

Sycamore:

- express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help
- speak in sentences, using familiar vocabulary, phrases and basic language structures
- develop accurate pronunciation and intonation

Chestnut:

- present ideas and information orally to a range of audiences
- read carefully and show understanding of words, phrases and simple writing
- appreciate stories, songs, poems and rhymes in the language

Beech:

- broaden their vocabulary and develop their ability to understand new words that are introduced into familiar written material, including through using a dictionary
- write phrases from memory, and adapt these to create new sentences, to express ideas clearly
- •describe people, places, things and actions orally and in writing

End of KS2 Outcomes:

Children will be able to understand and communicate ideas, facts and feelings in speech and writing, focused on familiar and routine matters, using their knowledge of phonology, grammatical structures and vocabulary.
